BEE DISEASE INSURANCE

All Registered and Junior Members of Kent BKA are covered by Bee Diseases Insurance for the first three colonies. Additional Premiums may be paid for up to 39 colonies. Other categories of membership (Friend, Partner) do not include this insurance. Any claim by Junior members will need to be made by their parent or guardian because beekeepers under the age of 16 years are unable to take out insurance policies.

The additional premiums are:

Up to 5 colonies (including the basic three) an additional £2.00

Up to 10 colonies (including the basic three) an additional £5.25

Up to 15 colonies (including the basic three) an additional £7.75

Up to 20 colonies (including the basic three) an additional £9.50

Up to 25 colonies (including the basic three) an additional £11.10

Up to 30 colonies (including the basic three) an additional £13.60 Up to 35 colonies (including the basic three) an additional £16.10

Up to 39 colonies (including the basic three) an additional £18.10

Making a claim on your policy is very simple. You need to:-

- 1. Contact your local Bee Inspector who will inspect your bees and confirm the presence or absence of symptoms of notifiable disease. Details of your local inspector can be found by entering your postcode in the search facility on the National Bee Unit's website.
- 2. If notifiable disease is confirmed the Bee inspector will give you a claim form. Please ensure all sections of the claim form are completed before sending it, along with a copy of your insurance receipt for the current year, to the Claims Manager whose details are below.

When does cover start?

BDI premiums are paid in respect of the calendar year, 1st January to 31st December. Insurance cover becomes effective each year from the time that the member's association receives his or her membership subscription and additional premiums.

Where such payment is made after 31st March cover will not commence until 40 days have elapsed from the payment of the subscription and any premium due. This is known as the 40-day rule. This is to prevent members starting or increasing cover during the active season when they may have already discovered the presence of disease.

Compensation Rates for 2014 season

Subject to Condition - Excellent-as New, Good or Poor.

No other property will be paid for. e.g. hive bodies are not covered.

Top bars for TBH/Warre hives will not be included under "Any other frame size" Compensation for destruction due to Small Hive Beetle incorporates a hive allowance. If claims have been made in the previous two consecutive seasons compensation will be reduced by 25%.

If claims have been made in the previous three consecutive seasons compensation will be reduced by 50%.

The maximum compensation payable to an individual is £2,500 in any one year of insurance.

The control of disease is an important part of beekeeping. Many of you have signed up to Beebase and receive notification of any outbreaks of AFB or EFB near you so you can be extra vigilant. You may also receive a visit from a seasonal bee inspector, depending on how close to your apiary any outbreak occurs. It is, of course, a matter for members whether or not to take advantage of this facility, hence the option on the form to decline.

Like all organisations, we have to abide by data protection legislation. Some people are reluctant to disclose their e-mail addresses but being able to contact members electronically results in a significant saving in time for branch secretaries and also reduces branch outlay on postage, paper etc. I find blind copying a very useful tool.
