It is extremely important at this time of year to keep an eye on stores. We have had periods of very mild weather when the bees have been out and about foraging. They are not the only creatures looking for food and during a particularly hard winter birds and mammals have a tough time. There are plenty of bird feeders on the market which are designed to keep out the larger, more aggressive birds and squirrels and allow robins, blue tits and the like to feed but woodpeckers have discovered a ready source of food i.e. the contents of a beehive.

I have regular visits from two green woodpeckers who keep my lawn aerated and a couple of greater spotted have discovered the suet balls hanging in one of my trees. During January I heard the familiar drumming sound they make and did wonder about my hives. So far I have been lucky and they haven't been targeted but woodpeckers can and do cause considerable damage.

To prevent a sound hive with many more years of life in it being reduced to a state where it is simpler to make a new one rather than try and repair, woodpecker guards have been designed by two members from Ruxley branch, Peter Jones and Barry Kemp, and have been constructed by members of the club. The design makes it almost impossible for the woodpecker's beak to access the hive wood and so cause damage and on warmer days the bees can come and go without hindrance.



Some of you may already know Robert Therry at Bouin-Plumaison. If you are in Montreuil in the Pas de Calais, then it is worth finding the time for a visit. You'll find him on the D349 2 miles from Hesdin. I too was there a few years ago along with a party of school children when extraction was the topic of the day. On discovering not only a couple of English beekeepers in their midst but also one who spoke very good French, my husband was interviewed by someone from the local radio station; whether his comments were broadcast I do not know. In early September (I think it is the second weekend but you will need to check) they hold a honey fair when, amongst other things you can watch extraction and purchase some of the honey straight from the frame and into the jar.



Mary Slater and Bob Jackman have a lot of fun during the summer talking to Beavers groups and school children. As they say in February's Beecraft, plenty of beekeepers visit schools and organise visits to their apiaries and almost all teachers will have the children doing follow-up work. The B Kids pages encourage young beekeepers so lets have a few more entries at the National this year for "An exhibition by schools of school bee craft". Children are, after all, the next generation of beekeepers so why not "catch 'em young".
